# DEVELOPMENT OF A MICRO-HOTPLATE FOR DIFFERENT METAL OXIDE GAS SENSORS WITH HIGH **OPERATING TEMPERATURE**

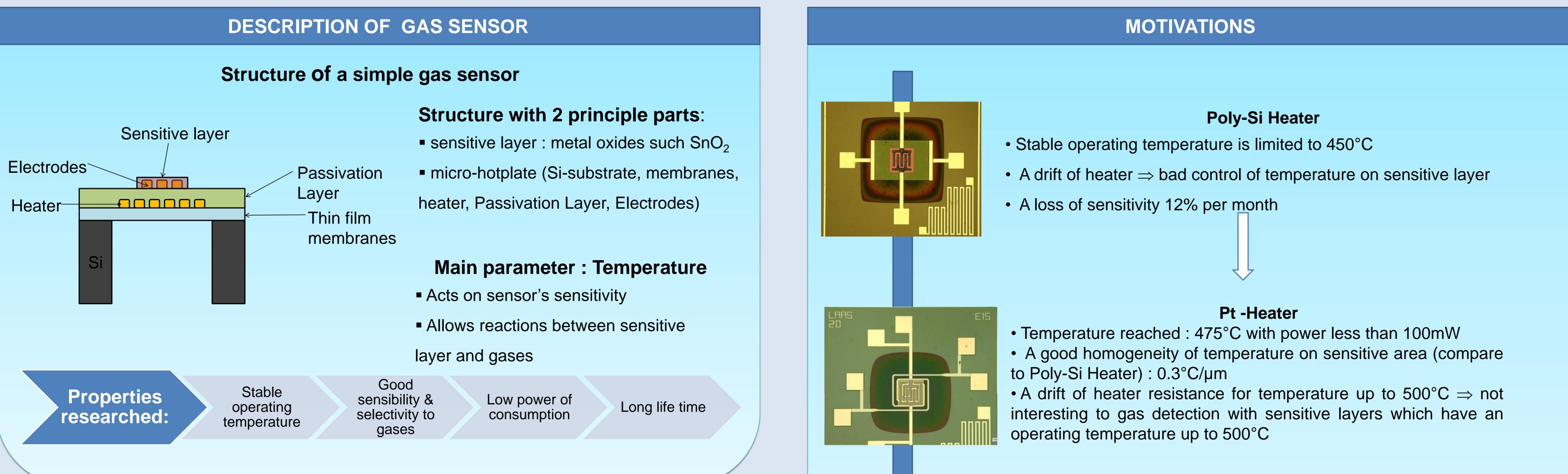
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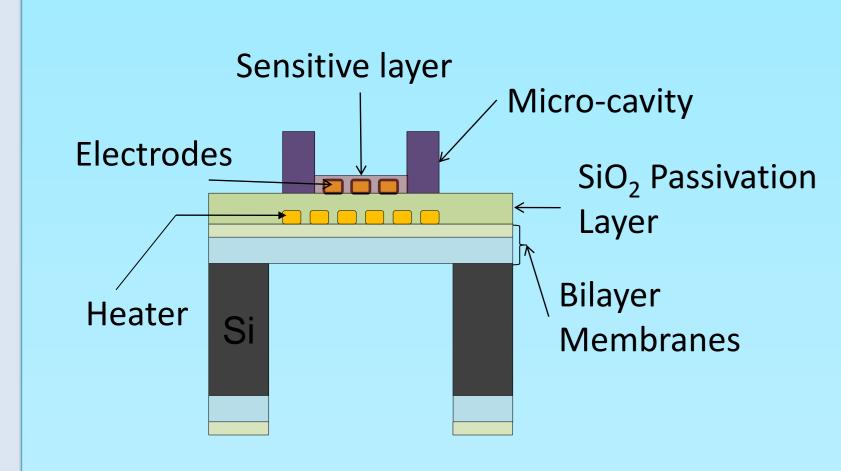
### ABSTRACT

The main goal of this work is to realize a metal oxide gas sensor with stable operating temperature. This article describes our approach and the technological process used to reach a high and stable operating temperature (650-700°C), with low consumption (100mW) and good thermal homogeneity all over the active area.



# **IMPROVEMENTS & TECHNOLOGICAL PROCESS**

### The new structure



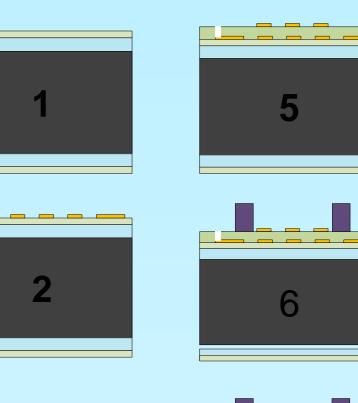
New thickness for heater (Pt/Ti 1500/150Å)  $\Rightarrow$  stress<100MPa for an annealing temperature up to 450°C

New design for heater (circular & spiral)  $\Rightarrow$  to obtain the most homogeneous temperature on the active layer

Motivation for this work: High (>500°C) & Stable operating temperature with a long lifetime Control & reproducibility of sensitive layer

Integration of micro-hotplate

## Micro-hotplate Technological Process



Si

Pt/Ti

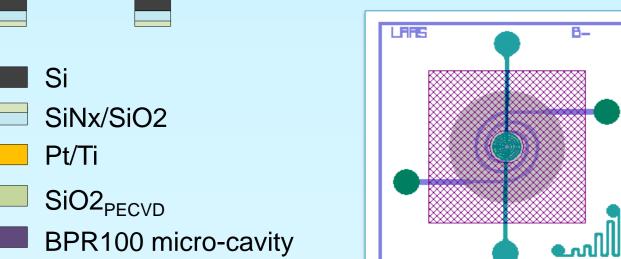
SiNx/SiO2

SiO2<sub>PECVD</sub>

- 1. Si-substrate after deposit of bilayer membranes (SiO2/SiNx) by LPCVD
- 2. Heater : Pt/Ti (150/1500Å)deposit by lift off process
- 3. Heater's electrical insulation with SiO<sub>2</sub> deposit by PECVD (0.5 $\mu$ m)
- 4. Heater's contacts opening by wet etching of  $SiO_2$
- 5. Interdigited sensitive layer's electrodes (idem 2)

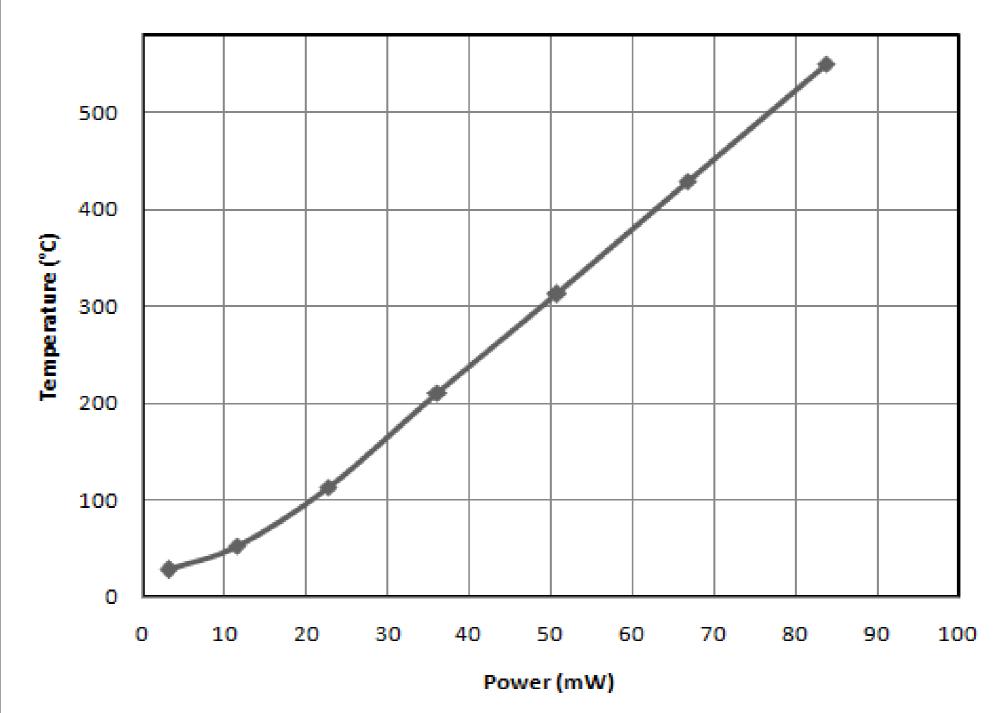


7. Backside etching of membrane (diameter 900µm)

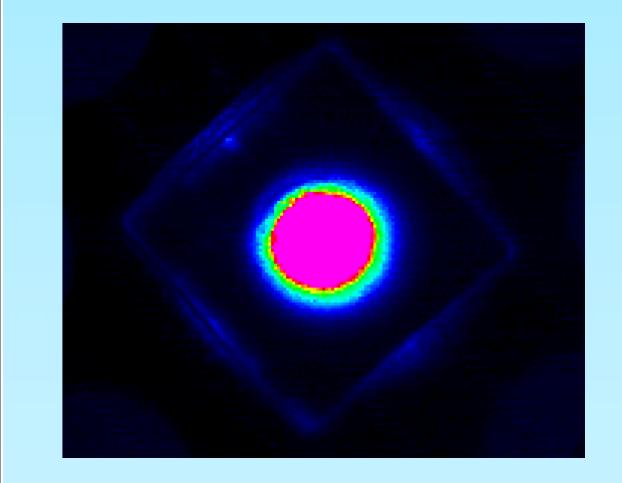


Cell size: 2\*2mm Diameter of Heater : 300µm Diameter of membrane etching: 900µm Diameter of active area 260µm

### **Temperature vs Power**



### IR-profil of Temperature vs. Power

• T  $_{\text{reached}} \approx 550^{\circ}\text{C}$  for a power less than 100mW

**BPR 100 Micro-cavity** 

To delimit and to control reproducibility of the active layer

Removable after a 150°C/1h30 - thermal treatment  $\Rightarrow$  30min by O2 plasma .

Stable behavior during several days with a constant power supply

Good homogeneity on active area :

 $\Rightarrow |\Delta T|_{max} = 45^{\circ}C.$ 

# **Conclusion & Work in Progress**

We are able to conceive a new micro-hotplate with a stable operating temperature up to 500°C and low consumption power. We are also proved the feasibility of a platform with circular micro-cavity allowing to a stable and reproducible deposit of sensitive layers for different modes of deposits such micro-injection or screen printing.

We are testing our sensors with a variable power supply in order to observe mechanical behavior of sensors

To reach our targets (stable operating temperature of 650-700°C), we are studying the possibility to work with other adhesion elements for Pt like molybdenum or tantalum because Ti adhesion layer cannot reach 600°C without the destruction of the micro-hotplate.
