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A LOW-COST AND EASY TO USE SORTING DEVICE FOR THE SEPARATION OF EXTRACELLULAR VESICLES FROM COMPLEX FLUIDS











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CONTEXT

Identifying and characterizing Extracellular vesicles (EVs) in biofluids could lead to unprecedented diagnosis/prognosis assays for a wide set of pathologies.

Owe to their complexity in size, origin, membrane markers, there is currently no ideal technology available yet to sort, to quantify and characterize cell-derived microvesicles, and fully relate their structure and functions which have high potential in clinical diagnostics and early treatment of life threatening diseases such as cancer, cardio vascular diseases....

SEPARATION PRINCIPLE: HYDRODYNAMIC FILTRATION

Exclusion of large particle from the streamlines located close to a wall

At the channel crossing, a particle flowing next to the sidewall: Sample ==>

- radius < R_c → flow in **lateral channel**
- radius > R_c → stay in the main channel

Advantages and drawbacks:

- ✓ Passive method ⇔ compatible with various applications
- ✓ Robustness ⇔ less prone to clogging than filter-based geometries
- ✓ Reliability ⇔ independent of flow and pressure drop

LAB ON CHIP: DESIGN AND MANUFACTURING

Choosing the appropriate dimensions of the channels, we designed and fabricated chips enabling the separation of vesicles at tunable cutoff (150 - 900 nm).



Fabrication process: successive lamination and photolithography

Dry Film: manufacturable process by laminating dry photosensible films

- Low cost
- Compatible with micronanotechnologies
- Biocompatible



Samples preparations

- Development of NP 140 / NP 480 / NP 920 calibrators: Biofunctionalization by proteins(OVA, CAS)
- Approx. 3500 CAS / NP 140 and 17000 OVA / NP 480
- Selective trapping verification by anti-CAS and anti-OVA



APPROACH

We propose to couple a microfluidic device (LOC) enabling to separate particles from a complex sample to a device allowing the capture of particles on specific spots and their analysis.


These methods allow obtaining important information on a chip about nanoscale vesicles in terms of size, membrane markers expression, and structure-function properties.



CHARACTERIZATION AND VALIDATION OF LAB ON CHIP



CONCLUSION

- Proof-on-concept: NP 140 and 480 were filtered while NP 920 were find in the unfiltered sample.
- Recovery conditions: 35 µL sample filtered in 30 minutes.
- With NPs in PBS-Tween20 and NPs in blood sample, we obtained the same recovery rate (100%) and filtration rate (96 to 98%).
- We showed high efficiency separation with NPs and biological fluids did **not affect** the separation.
- We are also improving the performances of the devices (filtration flow rate, filtered volume) and are coupling it to an immuno-trapping device in order to provide an integrated EVs sorting and capture bio-analytical system.
