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Context

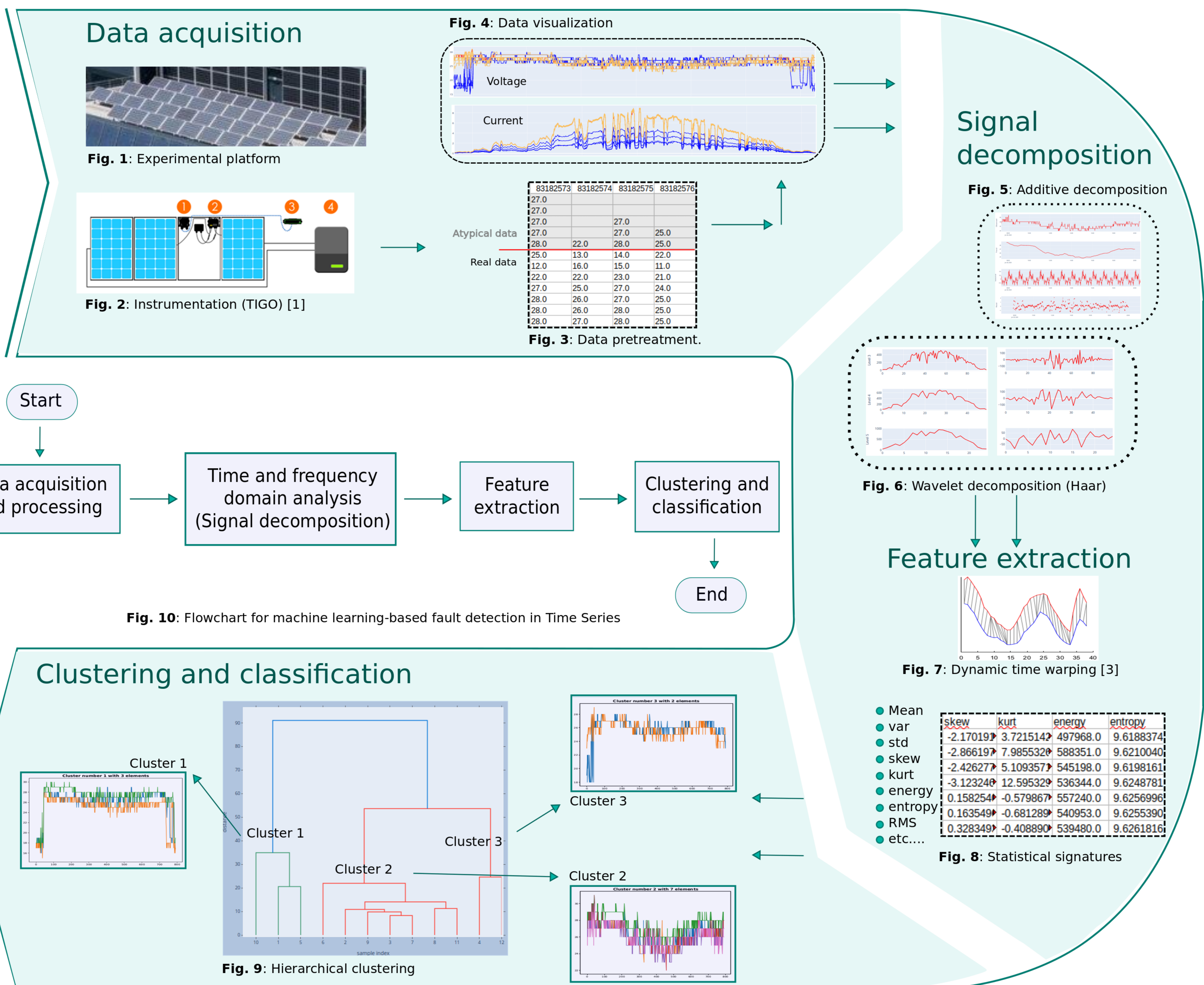

- Carry out the fault diagnosis without cutting off the production of the photovoltaic system.
- Adjust this solution in terms of cost / benefit in productivity or uptime.

- Continue testing new artificial intelligence algorithms.
- Increase the data sampling rate.
- Include the algorithms in an embedded system.
- Installation of new sensors
- Use statistical signatures as input to AI algorithms.
