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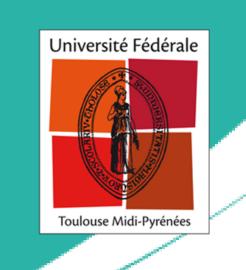

Use a nano-imprint lithography set-up (NX-2500 equipped with a double membrane system) for the molding of a temporary film on a flexible polymer sheet

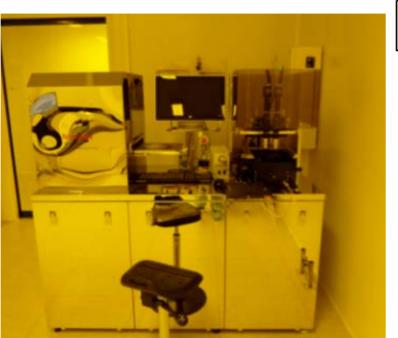
Advantages of the equipment

Isostatic pressure

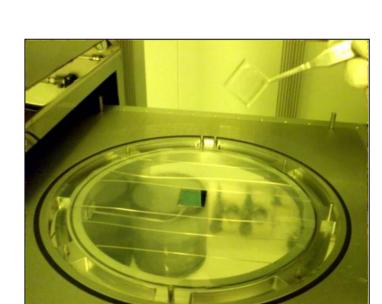
Homogeneous thickness of residual layer Better suited for fragile substrates such as **III-V** wafers

Air cushion system: the pressure is applied uniformely thanks to nitrogen pressure through the membranes

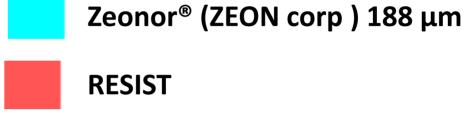

I₂: Imprint 14 bar 3 min UV 2 min

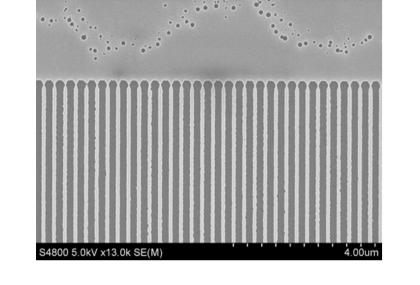
E₁. Residual layer etching (O₂)

Advantages of transitional soft mold

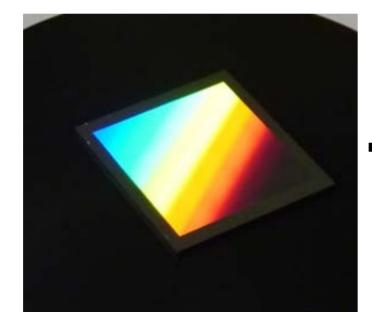
Less sensitive to dust, less mold degradation Replication of the mold without inversion **Zeonor®:** more rigid than flexible PDMS stamps (Young modulus of elasticity over 2000 Mpa instead of 8,2 Mpa for h-PDMS) ————— no pairing effect

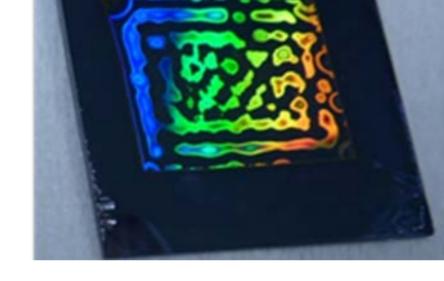

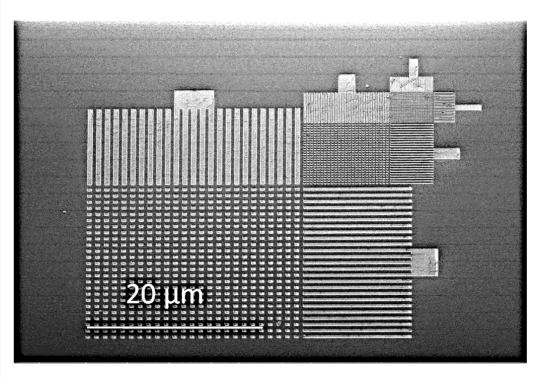

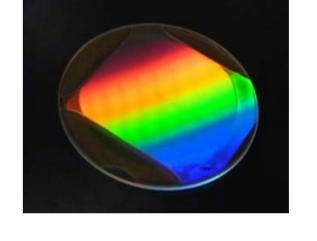

SEM image (tilt 45°) of lines and dots of 500 nm, 200 nm and 100 nm imprinted in the resist on Silicon



Gratings imprinted into resist from a silicon mold on a transparent substrate (visible light is decomposed by the gratings)

No dewetting No "bubbles"

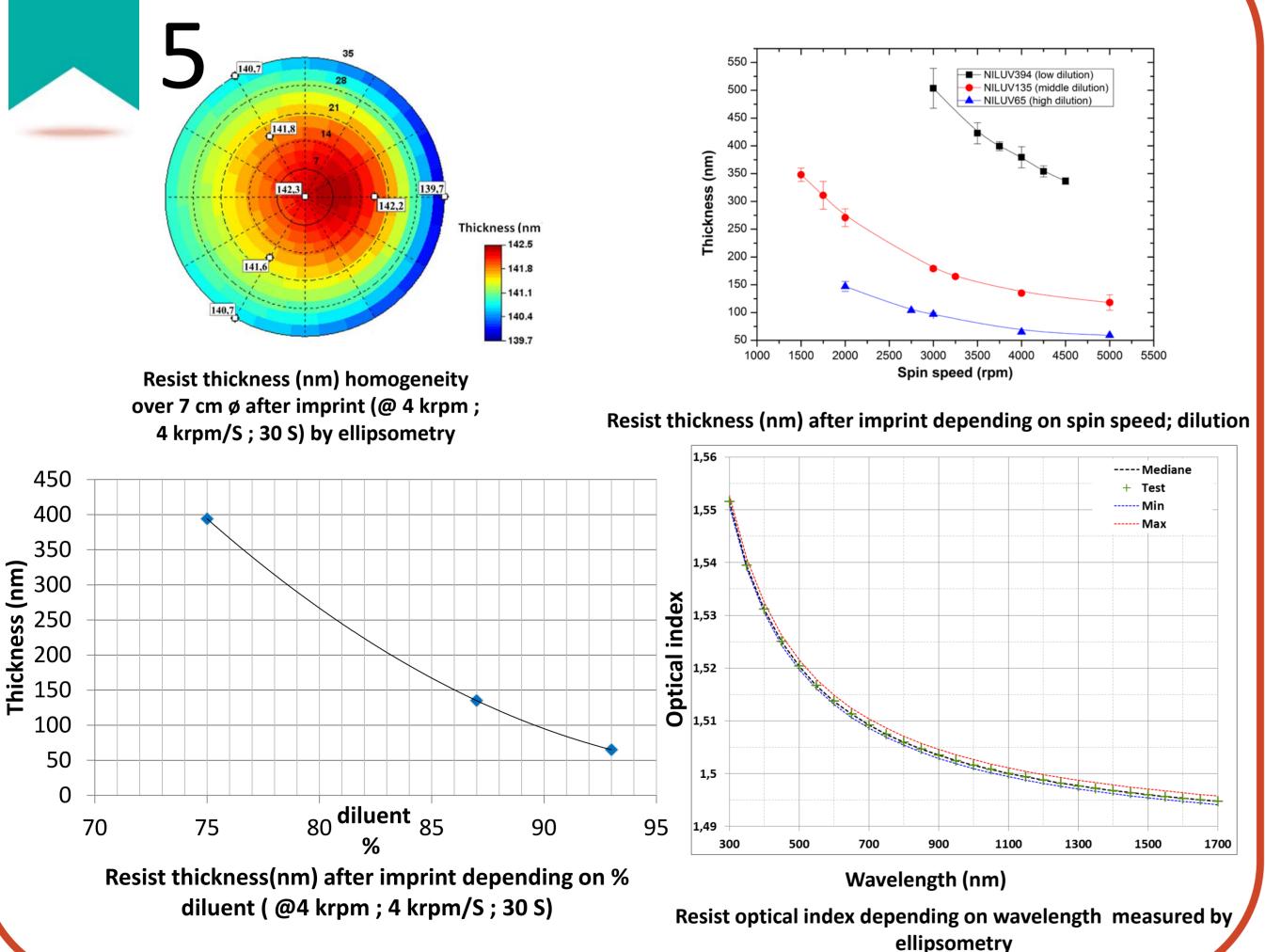


SEM image (tilt 45°) of lines of 250

- Down: dry etch transferred into Si

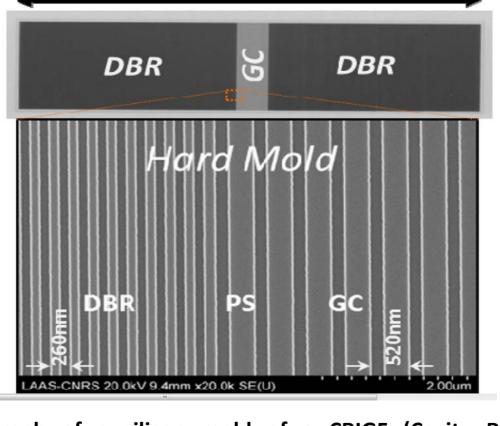

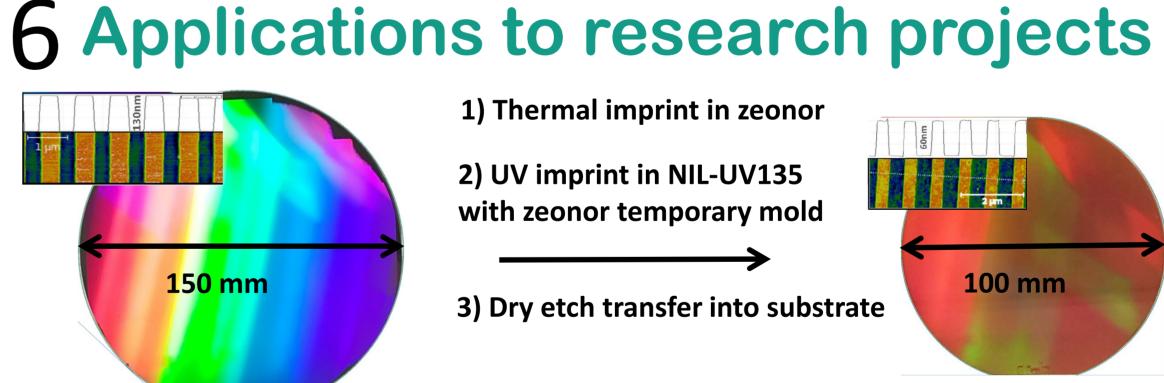
Photography of a GMRF (Guided Mode Resonance Filter) pattern on 6" silicon mold made by optical stepper and dry etching Grating periodicity is 880 nm with an etching factor of 57±3%. Rainbow

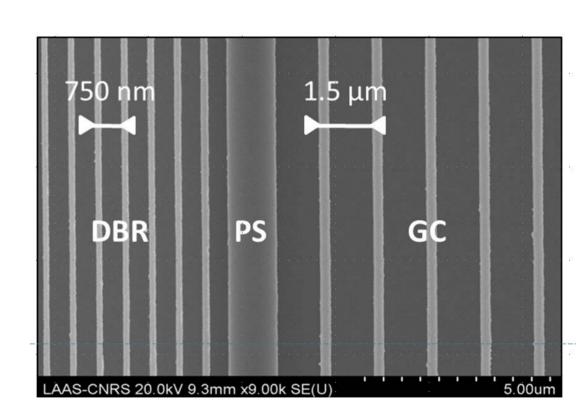

Conclusions /Future work

We designed a new UV nanoimprint resist adapted to the use of a transitional soft COP or COC mold to replicate or transfer submicro or nano features into hard materials such as silicon, silica or gallium arsenide. We have used this resist successfully to transfer submicro or nano features from a silicon mold into silicon, silica or gallium arsenide on small samples or full 4" wafers. This enables for instance the making of optical filters on transparent substrates on which direct stepper lithography can not be done easily. The knowledge of the resist content provides a good reliability of the process and enables adaptation of the resist to new applications (such as final optical index adjustment). Among currently investigatd and future works or those implying the use of the resist as an optical layer that will remain on the final device (as it is, or with optical index adaptation) and it's use for nanoscale metal deposition by lift-off process.
